## ***BODY of CHRIST***

Sometimes when we put away the calendar for a particular year, we may be tempted to say, *good riddance!* Years ago, when the British monarchy was mired in ‘soap opera’ scandals involving her children’s marriages, Queen Elizabeth declared 1992 an *annus horribilis*, a horrible year! How do we assess this year we’ve been through? As with any situation our community or nation finds itself in, some will be happy, some will not. We may be angry or discouraged at what we see going on around us, while some may choose to see what’s good for them, and that’s good enough. Money will insulate the well-to-do from feeling any financial discomforts, but how many of us feel that our paycheck can’t be stretched far enough to handle our mounting bills? Better days ahead? That’s what we’re hoping.

When there’s trouble in our population, if we’re not experiencing it directly, often we’ll hear the story of some individual or family that brings home the depths of pain this world is feeling. As Christmas rolls around year after year, we’re urged to gather coats, scarves, and gloves, contribute toys for tots, or take a group to help at a local soup kitchen. We’re certainly not hard-hearted like Scrooge, and we know the value of helping our neighbor. Paul shared this observation in 1<sup>st</sup> Corinthians 12:26: “If one part of the body suffers, all the other parts share its suffering. If one part is praised, all the others share in its happiness.” Next, he says, “Together you are the body of Christ.” He had told the Corinthians how they must rely on each other; the eyes need the hands, the head, the feet. In the musical “Sarafina”, this became a call to action as the schoolchildren of Soweto, South Africa, stood together to denounce apartheid: ‘An injury to one is an injury to all!’

We host a national ministry center in Baltimore for Global Refuge, a Lutheran organization that has served immigrants and refugees since World War II. In their gathering space, they have posted two important quotes about how we do God’s work for the sake of the world. Martin Luther asked, “What is it to serve God and to do his will? Nothing else than to show mercy to our neighbor.” The theologian and martyr of WW2, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, declared, “The Church is her true self only when she exists for humanity.” In other words, we’re not the church if we’re not a church *for others*. We’ll give people fish, and also teach them how to fish. We will denounce greed, corruption, and all manner of sins, and we’ll stand with those oppressed by such forces of evil, giving voice to those who have been silenced, and seeking justice for those who have been abused.

Paul warned the church at Corinth that it cannot act as the people of this world do, living as if there’s no tomorrow. 1<sup>st</sup> Cor. 15:34 says, “Be sensible and stop sinning. You should be embarrassed that some people still don’t know about God.” When we see our neighbor suffering, we can be what Luther called a ‘little Christ’ to them. Or, as we sang at church camp bonfires long ago, ‘Yes, they’ll know we are Christians by our love.’

## *A NOTE from YOUR CHOIR DIRECTOR*

On Sunday morning I was awakened by a scratchy noise. When I looked out the window there was beauty that took my breath away: a white winter wonderland with glistening snow on bushes and trees. Then I looked down on our driveway and there was the reason for the scratchy noise: my neighbor shoveling snow! "I know you had to get out," she said when I passed her on my way to church. The drive was magical; very seldom do you see undisturbed beauty when you drive through the streets of our neighborhood.

It is with this picture in mind that I sit down to write. "Do you write for Christmas?" my husband asks. "No," I answer, "the writing is meant for the new year." "The new year comes right after Christmas, when God did something new by coming into this world as a vulnerable baby," he continues our conversation, "he is reversing the curse that drove humans out of paradise - to now labor for food at great cost and bear children with great pain - by submitting himself to the care of his own creatures."

I think of the angels appearing to the shepherds in the field, a moment of heavenly glory. And I am reminded again of the Sunday morning landscape covered in snow, pristine and undisturbed. That picture did not last, and with the next rain will turn muddy. The shepherds did return to their tough life. Will our Christmas songs also disappear along with all the wrapping paper around our gifts? What will stay with us as we face the new year not knowing what it will bring?

"Lord, send us what you may, be it love or be it sorrow, I am content that both comes

out of your loving hand..." I remember this poem from my school days which Hugo Wolf turned into an art song. But even more strongly rings the poetry of Pastor Dietrich Bonhoeffer, who was imprisoned and finally executed by the Nazis, and who wrote this hymn awaiting the new year:

1. "By gracious pow'rs so wonderfully sheltered, and confidently waiting come what may, we know that God is with us night and morning, and never fails to greet us each new day.
2. Yet is this heart by its old foe tormented, still evil days bring burdens hard to bear; oh, give our frightened souls the sure salvation, for which, O Lord, you taught us to prepare.
3. And when this cup you give is filled to brimming with bitter suffering, hard to understand, we take it thankfully and without trembling out of so good and so beloved a hand.
4. Yet when again in this same world you give us the joy we had, the brightness of your sun, we shall remember all the days we lived through and our whole life shall then be yours alone.
5. By gracious pow'rs so faithfully protected, so quietly, so wonderfully near, we live each day in hope, with you beside us, and go with you through every coming year.
