GOD'S WORD

READING: Isaiah 11:1-9 Contemporary English Version Isaiah describes the coming of a future, ideal ruler who will renew David's royal line (the stump of Jesse). Gifted by the spirit of God, this ruler will reign with perfect justice. Enmity and danger will be restored to harmony and peaceful coexistence.

This is a reading from the prophet Isaiah, chapter 11. Like a branch that sprouts from a stump, someone from David's family will someday be king. The Spirit of the LORD will be with him to give him understanding, wisdom, and insight.

He will be powerful, and he will know and honor the LORD.

His greatest joy will be to obey the LORD.

This king won't judge by appearances or listen to rumors.

The poor and the needy will be treated

with fairness and with justice.

His word will be law everywhere in the land,

and criminals will be put to death.

Honesty and fairness will be his royal robes.

Leopards will lie down with young goats, and wolves will rest with lambs.

Calves and lions will eat together and be cared for by little children.

Cows and bears will share the same pasture; their young will rest side by side.

Lions and oxen will both eat straw.

Little children will play near snake holes.

They will stick their hands into dens of poisonous snakes and never be hurt.

Nothing harmful will take place on the LORD's holy mountain.

Just as water fills the sea, the land will be filled with people who know and honor the LORD.

This is God's Word, our hope.

HOLY GOSPEL: Luke 2:8-15 International Children's Bible God's greatest gift comes as a baby in a manger. Angels announce the "good news of great joy" and proclaim God's blessing of peace.

This is the Holy Gospel as the Word was given to Matthew, the 2nd chapter. That night (when Jesus was born in Bethlehem), some shepherds were in the fields nearby watching their sheep. An angel of the Lord stood before them. The glory of the Lord was shining around them, and suddenly they became very frightened. The angel said to them, "Don't be afraid, because I am bringing you some good news. It will be a joy to all the people. Today your Savior was born in David's town. He is Christ, the Lord. This is how you will know him: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a feeding box."

Then a very large group of angels from heaven joined the first angel. All the angels were praising God, saying:

"Give glory to God in heaven, and on earth let there be peace to the people who please God." Then the angels left the shepherds and went back to heaven. The shepherds said to each other, "Let us go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened. We will see this thing the Lord told us about." This is the Good News of Christ's victory!

Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, died 397

Ambrose was a governor of northern Italy and a catechumen when he was elected bishop of Milan. He was baptized, ordained, and consecrated a bishop all on the same day. While bishop he gave away his wealth and lived in simplicity. He was a famous preacher and is largely responsible for the conversion of Augustine. He is also well known for writing hymns. On one occasion, Ambrose led people in a hymn he wrote while the church in which they were secluded was threatened by attack from Gothic soldiers. The soldiers turned away, unwilling to attack a congregation that was singing a hymn. Ambrose is credited with authorship of three hymns in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, including "Savior of the Nations, Come" (ELW 263).
